Recipe of the Month



The recipe for the month comes out of the Bakersfield Highland Games program from April 10, 1999. This recipe was made in the Scottish Highlands and was typically made with any type of vegetable that they had in their gardens. The recipe here can be changed to fit your personal likes and dislikes. I unfortunately was unable to get the olde English version but I have tried all of the recipes that were published and will give you one this month and perhaps another one next month! Enjoy!

Hotch Potch

(also called "Hirst Bree – Harvest Broth")

1 ½ lbs of lamb or mutton
2 onions, chopped
2 Carrots, diced
1 Cauliflower, medium
1 Rutabega, diced
½ C Lettuce shredded
1 C Broad beans

1 C Peas, fresh or frozen
1 Tbs Parsley, chopped
1 TBS Sugar
1 TBS Salt
½ Tsp. Pepper
10 C water

Place the trimmed meat into a pot with the water and salt and bring to a boil. Skim off excess fat. Cover and simmer for 1 hour. Add the onions, carrots, rutabaga, beans and half the peas. Then add cauliflower cut into flowerets and shredded lettuce, the remaining peas, sugar and parsley and season to taste. Cover and simmer gently for another ½ hour or until vegetables are tender. The soup should be VERY thick!

Fashions of the Six Wives of Henry VIII

The six wives of King Henry VIII of England were a diverse group of fascinating women and they each had their own style and influence on fashions of their time. Each of these women were able to express themselves as individuals in their mode of dress even with the rigorous moral standards and rules governing women's attire during the years of 1509 A.D. to 1547 A.D. The following styles share many common aspects pertaining to those standards and rules. Most of the gowns were worn with a corset and some type of hoop or petticoat. Sleeves always reached the wrist and gowns always went to the floor. Women also had to cover their hair after marriage with some type of cap or headdress.

To understand the reason for the diversity in dress of these women, it is useful to have some basic background information on them. Henry VIII ascended the throne of England in 1509 A.D. His first wife was Katherine of Aragon. She was a princess from Spain. She had several pregnancies, but only one living child, Mary. Henry became increasingly distressed by not having an heir to his throne. He applied to the Pope for an annulment, but it took six years before Henry finally broke from Rome and became head of the church in England. He had his annulment granted within England and promptly married Anne Boleyn. Katherine was banished and eventually died of cancer in 1536.

Henry had fallen in love with Anne Boleyn after her return from service to the Queen of France, but it was six years before he was finally able to wed her. She also had many pregnancies, but only one living child, Elizabeth. After three years of marriage, Henry was deeply dissatisfied with his domestic life and the fact that he still did not have an heir. He had a charge of adultery, probably false, brought against Anne and she was beheaded in 1536.

Henry's next wife was a maid of honor to Anne Boleyn. Her name was Jane Seymour. Jane was a strong "matriarch in the making". She finally presented the king with his longed for heir, but tragically died of puerperal fever just two weeks after Prince Edward's birth, in October of 1537. Henry was heartbroken and it was three years before he married again.

Anne of Cleves was Henry's fourth wife. She was princess from a minor duchy in Germany. Hans Holbein painted her portrait for Henry and the king was delighted by it. He met the original in 1540 and was completely dismayed, complaining that Holbein had flattered her unduly. He had this marriage annulled after only seven months, on the grounds of non-consummation.

Henry then married Katherine Howard. She was the cousin of Anne Boleyn. She was extremely young when she married the king and soon proved to be light-minded and capricious. The king was more than happy with her until actual proof of adultery was shown to him and he had to have her executed as her adultery threatened the succession. She was beheaded in 1542.

Henry's sixth and final wife was Catherine Parr. Catherine had already been married twice previously and even though she was still young and childless, she was becoming quite pious and matronly. She finally provided the king and his children with a semblance of family life and Henry was happily married to her until his death in 1547. She went on to marry Jane Seymour's brother Thomas. She had her first child by him, a daughter, but Catherine contracted puerperal fever and died shortly after in 1548.

Katherine of Aragon brought many Spanish style gowns with her when she first came to England. A distinctive feature of the Spanish style in this time period is the farthingale. It was stiff conical hoop cage that belled out Katherine's skirts. Her gowns were made of velvet, cloth of gold and silver and satin. The gowns had court trains several yards in length. She had fur trims of ermine for the gowns and sleeves. She favored the early gable headdress with long frontlets and was often painted wearing this. She was very fond of jewelry and wore many rings. She had several different brooches for her bodices and long chains, some of which had crucifixes on them.

Anne Boleyn spent many years at the French court serving two consecutive queens. She became fluent in the French language and was instrumental in devising new modes of fashion. Her gowns were sometimes worn over a farthingale or sometimes over many petticoats. They were made of gold embroidered velvet, other velvets, cloth of gold and satin. Many had long, hanging oversleeves. Anne favored the French hood which was brought back by King Henry VIII's sister when she returned from France as the Dowager Queen. Anne wore the early version with a straight-sided coif, hood and billament.

Jane Seymour was maid of honor to both Katherine of Aragon and Anne Boleyn. She came from the English countryside and was from a family of minor nobility. Jane believed in the ceremony and etiquette at court and was always dressed appropriately. She too, wore the farthingale or many petticoats. She had many gowns of cloth of gold and damask. She favored jewelry and embroidery on her clothes. Her trains were usually about three yards. She wore a more updated version of the gable headdress in her portrait by Hans Holbein. These frontlets are shorter and the veil is split into two with one side on top of her head.

Anne of Cleves came from the duchy of Cleves in Germany. She did not speak any English when she arrived to marry the king and her clothes garnered many comments and stares from the English ladies. Her gowns were cut in the Dutch style, round without a train and may have been worn over a farthingale. The shoulders of her gowns were wide. The sleeves were large and sometimes puffed at the top and extremely wide at the wrist. The gowns were made of velvets and brocades. She wore the heavy gold chains favored by the Germans of this period and her clothes were often adorned with many pearls. She wore a headdress in the Flemish or Dutch fashion. It has a melon shaped frame and was covered

in pearls and goldwork. Her face is overshadowed by a stiffened rectangular piece of lawn.

Katherine Howard was very young when she married the king. He spoiled her and gave her many gowns of fine brocade and velvet. She favored the French fashions and often wore her motto embroidered on her sleeves. She often wore a partlet with a slightly turned back collar. She wore the newer version of the French hood. This one has a billament that is cut in a curve to swing behind the temples and curve around to the cheeks.

Catherine Parr was a pious queen, but she did enjoy beautiful clothes. Her gowns were made of damask, cloth of gold, brocade, satin and velvet. She favored a small upturned collar that was popular when she was queen. In her portrait by William Scrots, she wears a bonnet on top of her coif. It is adorned with pearls and has a white feather draped off the side.

This period has some common features in cut of dress and accessories. A very popular sleeve cut at the time was a hanging oversleeve. This consisted of a narrow sleeve that came a quarter of the way down the arm from the shoulder and was attached to an undersleeve that reached the wrist and was often large and slashed with the chemise or a contrasting fabric showing through. On top of this there was an oversleeve that was cut very wide and long. It was often lined with fur and turned back forming a much-oversized cuff on the forearm. Jewelry was also a very common accessory. Large brooches or pectorals were favored. Hans Holbein sketched many. Large pearls and diamonds were popular. A lot of jewelry was made up to represent a narrative of some kind (Scarbrick, 1990, p. 19). Women often carried jeweled pomanders to sweeten the air in a time when people did not believe in bathing. Wearing multiple rings was also popular at this time.

The six wives of Henry VIII made fine contributions to the fashions of their time. Their beauty and diversity are a testament to the glamour of the Tudor court in the early sixteenth century.
